

Seattle University Law Review Announces Its 2015 Symposium:

"Re-Tooling Food Law: How Traditional Legal Models Can Be Re-Tooled For Food System Reform"

Seattle University Law Review is soliciting articles and speakers for our 2015 symposium entitled, "Re-Tooling Food Law." The symposium will address current issues in food law—traditional legal tools that are transforming due to pressures in the food reform movement. The topics for the panels are still being developed, and all submissions will be considered. Special consideration will be given to topics related to speech issues (including First Amendment and defamation lawsuits) and fisheries issues (including contamination and depletion of food sources).

Please send questions and proposals to Melanie Pugh. Proposals should be no longer than one page, and include the following: (1) a summary of the proposed paper, identifying which laws are being "re-tooled"; (2) the expected page length of the article; and (3) whether your ability to attend the symposium in Seattle, Washington is contingent on travel reimbursement. (Limited reimbursement may be available for certain presenters, and determinations will be made once all proposals are received.) Proposals for speaking appearances without an article submission will also be accepted, but presenters with article submissions will be prioritized.
