Supervised consumption spaces, or spaces where people who use drugs can consume under medical supervision without fear of arrest or prosecution, have been shown to save lives, save money, and reduce outdoor drug use. While such spaces exist across the world, none exist in the United States. Seattle and King County recently approved recommendations to change that.

Join us for a screening of the Oscar-nominated documentary, “13<sup>th</sup>” by director Ava DuVernay. Named after the 13th constitutional amendment, which abolished slavery except as “punishment for crime,” the film uses archival footage and expert commentary to make the case that slavery hasn't disappeared from the U.S.—it's evolved into our modern system of mass incarceration, one in which many prisons are run by for-profit companies and prisoners can be paid a pittance to work for corporations.

The film provides access into the lives and homes of those who remain, all of whom have been indelibly changed by the events.
