

Other News

Deirdre Bowen spoke with several news outlets about a Washington state referendum that would reinstate affirmative action without quotas. Two stories appeared in The Seattle Times (follow-up story here), and a third in Crosscut.

Brooke Coleman spoke with <u>The New York Times</u> about revisions in the federal judiciary's code of conduct. She also spoke with <u>Bloomberg Law</u> about how a class settlement gag rule could be appealed. She was on a panel at the Ninth Circuit Judicial Historical Society Gala with Dahlia Lithwick, Hon. M. Margaret McKeown, Hon. Robert Lasnik, and Dean Lucy Daglish.

Diane Lourdes Dick has been selected to serve as the Reporter for the Dodd-Frank Study Working Group convened by the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts. The Working Group will study the implications of the insolvency scheme created for covered financial companies under the Dodd-Frank Act and provide a report to Congress by July 2020. Other members of the working group include federal district and bankruptcy judges, a bankruptcy clerk of court, and staff from the AO and the Federal Judicial Center.

Jack Kirkwood joined a law and economics professors' amicus brief to the Ninth Circuit in support of class certification in *Qualcomm*. The district court certified a class that could include 250 million consumers.

John McKay was featured on <u>KUOW</u> for a discussion about the process of impeachment.

Sara Rankin was quoted in <u>The Stranger</u> for a story about Caffe Vita employees who were fired for giving away coffee and food to people experiencing homelessness. (The story also appeared in the Portland Mercury.)

Steve Tapia was a guest on <u>KUOW's The Record</u> to talk about how privacy regulations around the world affect how the internet works.
