Publications

Lori Bannai and Maggie Chon, together with co-author Eric Yamamoto, recently published Race, Rights, and National Security: Law and the Japanese American Incarceration. Building on prior editions, this third edition uses the Japanese American incarceration as a lens through which to critically examine the ways in which the country sacrifices civil rights, including discriminating against and dehumanizing vulnerable communities, in the name of national security. It links earlier immigration exclusion cases and discriminatory laws, the WWII-era incarceration decisions such as *Korematsu v. United States*, and post-9/11 national security cases to the so-called Muslim ban case: *Trump v. Hawaii*. The book thus probes the intersection of civil liberties with national security and plenary power over immigration. It serves simultaneously as a teaching, research, and advocacy resource, gathering a wide range of content, including original source documents, personal stories, cases, and photos in one volume.
