Honorariums for Symposium panelists were made possible in part by the generous donation of the Loren Miller Bar Association in the name of the late Hon. Charles V. Johnson. Judge Johnson was a local civil rights leader with a long and distinguished career with the NAACP: as president of the Seattle Chapter from 1959 to 1964, then president of the NAACP's Northwest Area Conference from 1965 until the early 1970s, and finally as a member of the national NAACP's Board of Directors from 1968 to 1995. Judge Johnson was also known as a tireless and extremely effective advocate for the improvement of the judiciary and the judicial system. He practiced law in Seattle from 1958 to 1969. Judge Johnson was with the Seattle Municipal Court from 1969 to 1980 and served three terms as its Presiding Judge. In 1981, he was appointed to King County Superior where he served as Presiding Judge from 1990 to 1993. Judge Johnson remained with the Superior Court until his retirement in 1998.
